With the look of a Hawk a Sunshine bat continues climb

You would have bet your life it was Dermott Brereton out there with a baseball cap squeezed down over his eyebrows.

At lonely Barclay Park, Sunshine, where a never-ending stream of trains slowly rattle along the nearby tracks, a dozen or so baseballers are completing a complicated drill.

Surely it has to be Brereton, kicking up dust along the dirt path between home plate and first base.

It is not just the shock of blond hair bouncing out the back of the cap. Look at the powerful build, complete with barrel chest and

It is little wonder that just about everyone at the Sunshine Baseball Club calls Rob Meates "Dermie" — the resemblance to the Hawthorn centre half-for-ward is uncanny. Even Meates himself acknowledges it.

But when it comes to personal-ity, the powerful first baseman and home-run specialist says he and the flamboyant Hawthorn forward are poles apart.

Meates regards himself as
more the quiet type and, despite
his size and obvious strength,
prefers to stay out of the rough
stuff for which baseball has
earned itself a reputation.

Last Sunday, when the Victorian Baseball Association
semi-final between Sunshine and

semi-final between Sunshine and Waverley errupted into a brawl, it was significant that Meates stood back at first base for a while before stepping in between teammates and opp

between feammates and opposi-tion to make sure things did not get too far out of hand. "That situation was just ridicu-lous," he says. "Fighting for the sake of lighting does nothing for me, and what happened on Sun-day was completely unnecess-ary.

"The only time you ever see baseball on television is when there is a brawl, and that is unfortunate because people come to expect that. I know there is a lot more to the sport, and that is why I am playing it."

Meates's best friend at the club, Neil Burke, needed stitches to the head after the brawl. "Had I seen the incident I might have got a bit more aggressive," Meates confesses. Waverley's David Teale received a four-week suspension for hitting

Burke and will miss the rest of

the finals.

Meates plays baseball for the challenge of planting the nar-row, rounded bat on to a speed-ing ball with such perfect timing that it soars over the home run

He managed to do it against He managed to do it against Waverley in a game that Sun-shine lost 7-8, and a week earlier against Malvern he pounded a monster, clearing the left-field fence and landing the ball in the creek alongside the South-East-ern Freeway.

This is only his second season back after almost five years out

In is sonly mis second season back after almost five years out of the sport with a shoulder injury. Meates's success this year has made many wonder just how good he would have been had he played right through.

At 19 Meates, then a catcher, represented his state and country and was recognised as one of Australia's great prospects in a sport in which players normally

sport in which players normally reach their peak at a late age. "In America, most players don't play major league baseball until they are in their 30s," says the 29-year-old. "I think I am hitting better than ever — I don't panic as much at the plate as I did when I was a youngster." The good form gained Meates a place in the Victorian Claxton Shield team for the recent carnival in New South Wales, and with 20 hits from 47 times at bat for a batting average of 0.428 and a grand display at first base, he was included in the carnival all-star team.

Now Meates knows that a
place in the Australian side for
this year's Asian series in Japan
is a possibility. After a nine-year
break since he last reached
those dizzy helghts, he is feeling
a little like a rookle who is in
there waiting for a chance at his
first national cap.

Sunshine takes on Malvern in
an elimination semi-final on Saturday and Waverley and Essendon play for a place in the VBA
grand final on Sunday. Both
games will be at Kooyong Park,
Malvern.






Memorial for Robert Meates
